Northeastern hosts 1,000 Boston public school students and teachers for women's basketball game

In November 2022, one thousand students and teachers from eight Boston Public Schools filled buses provided by Northeastern to come to the Northeastern Huskies women's basketball game against Boston College as part of an annual—and highly popular—community event hosted by the office City and Community Engagement. "Here come your Huskies!" shouted the public address announcer, and the crowd response was ear-splitting. The guests received a Huskies T-shirt and lunch as part of the field trip. The students' enthusiasm brought life to the historic arena. They filled the courtside seats and cheered for every basket while providing the Huskies with a robust home-court advantage. The game turned in the final minute as the Huskies lost, 64-59, to Boston College. The teachers said the students had been looking forward to the event for several weeks. "They've been super excited," said Mary Phalante, who co-teaches the sixth grade with Sandra Munique at Charles H. Taylor Elementary School in Boston, five miles from Northeastern. "Knowing that this is right here in your city and that it is something to look forward to while you go to college—that is very important."

Northeastern hosted "A Tribute to the Dream" celebration honoring the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. held at East Village on the Boston campus. A panel of alumni, led by Richard Harris, associate dean of diversity, equity, and inclusion, director of the multicultural engineering program, and member of the faculty in the department of Africana studies, discussed King's vision of education. They also discussed the importance of morals and values in producing a person's character and the leadership needed to move the United States forward as a nation and as a people.


John D. O'Bryant, Boston civil rights leader, honored at the Embrace Memorial.

After years of anticipation, the long-overdue Kings memorial—a 22-foot high artwork titled "The Embrace"—was officially unveiled on Boston Common in the city where they met, fell in love, and became partners in the civil rights movement. Embedded in its surrounding pavement were the names of 69 civil rights leaders of Boston whose works inspired and were inspired by the Kings. John D. O'Bryant, a U.S. Army veteran and former teacher in the Boston Public Schools, was among the honorees in no small part because of his election in 1977 as the first Black person in 75 years to serve on the Boston School Committee. John D. O'Bryant, the former vice president of student affairs at Northeastern, was a renowned civil rights leader in Boston. The

university's African American Institute is named after him, as is the John D. O'Bryant School of Mathematics and Science in Roxbury. The honorees included also included Charlotte M. Nelson—program director of the <u>Center for Law, Equity and Race</u> at Northeastern's School of Law—and her late husband, Leon T. Nelson, founder of the Greater Roxbury Chamber of Commerce.





For the past five years, architecture associate teaching professor Kate Kennen and her team at Offshoots and Horsley Witten Group spearheaded a landscape project at Northeastern's Henderson Boathouse, which abuts the Charles River on Soldiers Field Road in Boston. This project helps to prevent contaminants from reaching the river.
